James Schlender called the meeting to order at 7:38 a.m.

Motion by Shuman, 2nd by Reid, to approve the agenda as presented. Motion carried

Motion by Hoff, 2nd by Shuman, to approve the minutes of the September 9, 2019 meeting. Motion carried.

Schlender called for nominations for Chair of the CJCC. Shuman nominated James Schlender. Motion by Shuman, 2nd by Hoff, to close nominations. James Schlender is Chair of Criminal Justice Coordinating Council.

Chair Schlender called for nominations for Vice-Chair of the CJCC. Hoff nominated McCoy. Motion by Shuman, 2nd by Hoff, to close nominations. Kathy McCoy is Vice-Chair of the CJCC.

Reviewed By Laws. Motion by Shuman, 2nd by Hoff, to amend the Section A membership to include the second LCO Tribal Governing Board Representative. Motion carried

Chair Schlender, Hoff, McCoy, Sheriff Mrotek, and Clerk of Court will meet to review the Sawyer County Bond Schedule. This will be on the November agenda for approval.

Chair Schlender introduced LCO Tribal Governing Board Representative Lorraine Gouge. Introductions were made around the table.

The Adult Law Enforcement Proxy gives charging options to officers. Provides for first offenders to enter diversion programs and not go through the court system. This can move forward once the Ordinance is updated. The District Attorney has made referrals for 40 individuals to the Prime for Life education based diversion program since March 2019

Criminal Justice Coordinator Diane McNamer reviewed current programming. Meeting with Karen Breit at LCO regarding the reentry program and possible grants. AB Kiosk on National Public Radio. Construction based program to educate inmates and provide jobs. Shuman asked about a second AB Kiosk located at LCO. The kiosk needs a minimum number of testers to remain budget neutral. A bus stops at the Courthouse at 8:00 am if someone needs a ride. Council requested McNamer bring detailed costs to the November meeting showing the cost of the program for tribal members.

McNamer introduced members of GHAMA, Greater Hayward Area Ministerial Association. Gary Hilgendorf from Spider Lake Church and Timothy Warner from Northern Lights Christian Center.

GHAMA is working on a male halfway house with Crossroads ministry out of Ashland. Currently fundraising for a location. GHAMA recently opened New Reflections Pathway to Hope, a women's home on County Highway B for women and children working on recovery. The facility has a thrift shop attached run by volunteers and relies on grants and donations.

LCO is also working on establishing a male housing unit. Moving Oakwood Haven, the women's shelter to a larger facility. May use the vacated building for the men's shelter.

From Sept 2018-Sept 2019 results for Bail bonds for LCO

- 100% LCO tribal members
- OWI's: 9 were referred for bail bonds. 9 received services from BWC=100%
- Drug offenses: 59 total participants
 - Of the 59; 39 received services from BWC= 66%
 - Of the 59; 14 received detox and/or residential services=24%
 - Age/Gender breakdown
 - 18-25: 4 males 4 females
 - 26-40: 6 males 13 females
 - 41-55: 6 males 5 females
 - 55+: 0 males 1 female
 - Actions taken for to account for these numbers
 - Matrix group (T/W/R 10-11:30) -5 attend
 - Creation of MAT program
 - Referrals for more services (i.e. if only in BH/AODA; referral to CCS)

Bail Bond Testing Report for 9/1/18 to 9/30/19

- There were 187 bail bond testers for this time period. 128 were testing with Sawyer County and 59 with LCO. Note the two locations are determined by the tester due to location of their residence and ease to test, not whether they are a tribal member or not.
- 81 Caucasian testers and 31 Native Americans tested at Sawyer County.
- 73 Native American testers at LCO with 2 Caucasian testers.
- There were 3,435 tests conducted during this time frame of which 2,643 were done by Sawyer County and 792 by LCO.
- On average 29 tests per person were conducted for Sawyer County and 16 tests on average for LCO
- 47 testers were for OWI or alcohol based offenses
- 140 testers were for drug based offenses
- \$32,312.58 was spent for oral swabs and sweat patch testing for this time period
- 125 cases of oral swabs were purchased for a cost of \$10,008.38 and \$22,304.20 purchased the sweat patches and the lab analysis
- 42% of all Sawyer County based testers did get involved with AODA or other counseling pre-sentence.
