Chair Bill Voight called the meeting to order.

Motion by Schleeter, 2nd by Bassett, to approve the Agenda with one change; move #7 Employee Recognition to after agenda. Motion carried

Sawyer County Sheriff Mark Kelsey introduced Deputy Mike Woller and Deputy Ginger Knight. Deputy Woller and Deputy Knight were commended and presented with a framed Letter of Recognition for their actions on June 25, 2016.

Motion by Bassett, 2nd by Dennis, to approve the minutes of the June 7, 2016, meeting. Motion carried.

The Committee reviewed the Clerk of Courts Report

The Committee reviewed the Child Support Report

Jail Administrator Joe Sajdera reviewed the jail report with the Committee. Three new part-time employees were hired; looking for three more. There was a jail inspection the end of June. The inspector commended the staff on the order and cleanliness of the jail. 14 out of 25 Huber inmates are working. Inmates earn one day off their sentence for 24 hours of community service. County Board jail tour is July 21, 2016.

Supervisor Humphreys inquired about the K9 fundraiser. Discussion on whether the prizes are appropriate. The prizes are firearms; first prize is an AR15 varmint sporting rifle. The raffle was organized by the Sheriff's Department staff and the Lions. New shirts are also available to support the K9 fundraiser; they are \$15.00.

A cross walk on Fifth Street from the Jail to the Courthouse has been requested from the City of Hayward. The County may go ahead and put in a sidewalk from Fifth Street to the Courthouse on county property.

Animal Control Sherrie Shelton reviewed her report with the Committee. 400 individuals who owned dogs in 2015 have not licensed their dog in 2016. Ms. Shelton has sent out 85 notices and plans on sending more before the end of the year. LCO Clinic was a success.

The Committee received the Coroner's Report

Emergency Manager Pat Sanchez presented her report. The County alert messaging system is changing from Code Red to Nizle. There are four fire departments signed up with MABAS, Mutual Aid Box Alarm System.

The Committee received the Communications System Specialist report from John Kruk.

Ambulance Director Eric Nilson provided the Committee with a monthly report of wages, number of runs, run times, and response times.

The Committee discussed a full-time Emergency Management Service (EMS). Administrator Tom Hoff presented a draft proposal for 24/7 coverage at North and South Stations, roaming medics, and On Call at two alternating locations. The proposal includes an EMS Levy of \$765,198 and raises taxes on a \$100,000 home by around \$15.00.

The Committee instructed Administrator Hoff to request information from surrounding providers regarding the cost of providing emergency services to Sawyer County.

The Chair invited audience participation. Paramedic Taylor Heinzl, EMT Brandon Frierhood, and County Board Supervisor Elaine Nyberg addressed the Committee.

Motion by Bassett, 2nd by Schleeter, to forward the proposal for full-time Emergency Management Service (EMS) to the Administration Committee and the Sawyer County Board. Motion carried.

Motion by Schleeter, 2nd by Bassett, to adjourn. Motion carried.

Re: Annual Jail Inspection

Dear Sheriff Kelsey:

On June 21, 2016 and June 22, 2016, the annual inspection of the Sawyer County Jail was conducted pursuant to WI Statute 301.37(3). The inspection compared the facility and its operation to applicable state statutes and Department of Corrections' Administrative Code Chapter DOC 350. This report summarizes my findings, including the progress made following the 2015 inspection, any statute or administrative code violations, physical plant and maintenance issues, and an overall summary of facility operations. The inspection worksheet document, attached to this report, includes detailed inspection results.

On June 21, 2016 there were 67 inmates incarcerated in the facility and on June 22, 2016 there were 72 inmates incarcerated in the facility. Three inmates were being held in Bayfield County and one Huber transfer inmate was in Rusk County.

Progress following the 2015 Inspection

Door and locking system upgrades have been completed. Computer system upgrade completed; photo capturing component.

Jail supervisors routinely review, approximately every two weeks, the daily observation logs to ensure completeness, accuracy and facility and code compliance. Maintain review documentation.

Two additional cameras have been installed in F Block to address "blind spots".

Currently, three part time staff has been hired. Jail administration is hopeful to have a total of six part time positions hired, trained and on staff. There are full time positions that have been vacated recently that are in the process of being filled.

One of the most significant initiatives on going is the completion of the jail policy and procedure manual review, revision and additional policies. On the day of the inspection I received approximately 26 policies. I have reviewed the policies submitted and my findings have been forwarded to the jail administrator. A number of policy findings can be found in the inspection worksheet document attached.

Deficiencies/Compliance Plans

DOC 350.09- Policy and procedure manual. DOC 350 was promulgated, published and effective September 1, 2014, that requires updated or additional policies and procedures is developed and implemented. I received twenty six policies on the day of the inspection and seven policies in 2015 following that inspection. I have reviewed all policies and have noted areas that require completion. The policy worksheet document recently forwarded to the jail administrator identified these areas. I commend all the time and effort that has provided completed policies thus far and am hopeful the remainder can be completed, reviewed and approved by this office prior to the end of the 2016 year. If you have questions or require assistance contact me.

DOC 350.19(4)-Fire Safety. Staff training requires annual simulated or practiced fire evacuation or other procedures be provided. Ensure this is completed during your current training calendar. It is noted that annually the fire hoses are run through the facility and fire extinguisher training is provided.

Maintenance Items

The following items are in need of attention to ensure a healthful condition as outlined in WI Statute 302.37:

- Continue to monitor the temperatures in the inmate housing units and document.
- Clean the shower walls in the old section of the jail; Huber area. All are in need of additional attention.
- As a reminder: Receiving cell #5 (linear section) is not utilized as such due to a broken toilet that can't be repaired. Ensure through policy that this receiving cell is not used for its original intended purpose.
- Remove the writing found in Secure A housing unit on a dayroom table.

The facility is maintained in an exemplary, sanitary and good condition. It is apparent that a meaningful maintenance program exists; Dan Witt – Maintenance, continues to address and meet or exceed the facility condition needs. My compliments on the facility maintenance continued efforts.

Summary of Jail Operations

The jail is attached to the sheriff's department.

The podular jail, occupied in 2008, consist of a jail control pod surrounded by inmate housing units. A booking area attached consist of two receiving cells, one holding room, shower area, booking area, storage, etc. A pre-booking area is located adjacent to the entrance to the facility and secured vehicle sallyport. Additional storage is located in the podular section as well as interview rooms, a program room and the jail medical exam room and office. The facility laundry area is located in the secure vehicle sallyport area.

The linear section, remodeled in 2009, consist of the secured kitchen area, storage, visiting booths, male and female locker rooms, interview and program room, one receiving cell and one receiving cell not in use and inmate dormitories for minimum classified inmates and Huber privilege inmates. Additional supervisory offices and work areas are attached to the linear section of the facility.

Double bunking:

- The facility received approval from this office on September 8, 2014, to install bunks in cells identified; thus double bunking approval in housing units A and C that added an additional 12 beds. The double bunks in A and C have not been utilized due to staffing shortages. When staffing levels meet the agreement and you are able to implement usage notify this office.
- Housing unit D was double bunked in April 2008, which added an additional 3 bunks that are in use and did not require additional staffing.

Interviews with inmates found few areas stated as concerns; a diet request was addressed on the day of the inspection and an inmate charge for nursing follow-up was being addressed. I received a number of positive comments from inmates incarcerated regarding the condition of the facility, programs provided and general fair and consistent staff treatment.

Additional programs implemented recently include; Parenting Forever: facilitated by UW Extension staff, Adult Literacy and GED instruction (no on site testing) facilitated by WI Indianhead Technical College staff and College Introduction and AODA Group facilitated by LCO Tribal members. A bible study group is provided weekly.

Safety and security inspections are completed: they include monthly door and lock inspections, annual fire inspections, additional fire equipment and fire alarm inspections, annual sprinkler inspection, daily and monthly facility inspections, monthly fire safety inspections, monthly panic alarm inspections, monthly generator testing, monthly pest control inspections and annual fire extinguisher inspections. SCBA hydro-testing was completed on March 30, 2016. Routine searches are completed within the facility on a scheduled basis; records reviewed from May 2015 through May 2016.

Staff training records includes training required per DOC 350 as well as additional training in inmate classification, drug identification and additional correctional officer subject matter training with the exception of practiced or simulated evacuation procedures.

There were no juveniles held in the facility and inmates in need of educational programming (GED or HSED) are provided educational programs facilitated by instructors employed by the local Department of Public Instruction (DPI). The jail administration notifies DPI of any inmates in need of educational instruction. Juveniles do not enter the secure facility; they are processed in the pre-booking area adjacent to the booking area entrance. Policy #J-02/Juveniles addresses the procedure that includes no juveniles in the facility and a procedure to ensure no adult inmates are in the area during juvenile intake.

Facility support areas; kitchen and medical, continue to provide programs that meet the inmates nutritional and medical needs. Both areas were found in good order with no identified compliance concerns with the exception of the jail kitchen sharps procedure that is recommended be included in the food service policy #J-9E. No inmate workers are used in this area and you may want to consider adding that in policy as well. Jail nursing three times a week consists of a total of sixteen hours. Evaluating additional hours is recommended. Currently, the jail nurse is allowed some overtime to complete duties.

The annual inspection of the facility by the county board or sub-committee is scheduled to be completed on July 21, 2016.

Corrections Officer Jody Kollmorgen assisted with the walkthrough inspection of the facility. His professional presence, correctional knowledge and observation of sound correctional practices followed are applauded. Officer Kollmorgen donned an SCBA in a proficient manner. Additional staff interviewed is commended for their assistance and ability to articulate policies and procedures. Observations of staff interactions with inmates, the public and colleagues confirm a dedicated and professional staff. It is noted that due to current staff shortages a majority of shifts are operating at the minimum staff level that results in extremely heavy workloads. The staff climate remains positive through this difficult and challenging timeframe.

Department Expectations following the 2016 Inspection include:

- Address maintenance items noted above; shower walls and caulking in the Huber section.
- Ensure fire evacuation practiced or simulated training is included in annual staff training provided.
- Notify this office once you have reached your staffing levels required to use double bunks installed as noted above.
- Continue to complete policy review and revision. It is hoped this is completed and approved by this office by year's end (2016).
- Evaluation of nursing hours is recommended. With the addition of a few hours the nursing coverage could be increased to five days a week. Currently, the jail nurse is on site three days a week.


Approval

The Sawyer County Jail is approved by the Department of Corrections for the secure detention of adult offenders with the maximum capacity of 92 increasing to 104 once double bunking takes effect. This approval is contingent on the correction of the deficiencies noted above and continued compliance with all applicable state statutes and administrative codes.

Sawyer County Communications System Specialist – August 2016 PS Committee Report

Unable to attend due to working on radio upgrade project commitments

- 1.) **Sheriff Channel Upgrade** – The project continues with many FCC licensing issues coming about. With the data connectivity in place with two sites simulcasting will begin this month with sites brought on line one by one. Digital testing has started on a small and controlled basis. Plans for reprogramming, education, and system migration are being formulated at this time. Due to being co-located on tower sites the prep and work is hampered by access and authorization.

- 2.) **Radio Communications/Command trailer during the flooding event** – During the flood operations, that occurred the day of the last public safety meeting, we were able to give two items a significant test. This was the mobile command trailer and the communications system on the analog side. The red command trailer which sat vacant and unused for many years started a transformation process at the end of 2014. This process was to clean-up the trailer, add a new pass through opening from front to back, add an AC/heat pump to the roof, and do a complete revamping of ALL the communications equipment in the trailer.

This has resulted in having a dispatch console installed, connection to a total of 12 base radios (with WISCOM, Birkie, and local businesses channels), and communication tools such as a printer and flat screen TV (30”). Through this transformation it was able to be requested and deployed to the Town of Hayward Fire Dept. for the duration of the event and serve as a forward command post. This took all event/incident comms and put them at the FD instead of taxing or burdening dispatch while they still deal with day to day operations.

Along those lines the newly revamped ‘Sawyer Common Channel’ was utilized throughout the event as the means of communication between ALL agencies in the county. This new channel is connected to the WISCOM System for this purpose and in this instance. During this event we had true ‘interoperability’ for people on WISCOM to talk to ‘legacy’ system users. In addition, through the design and setup of a portable/deployable MARC 1 repeater we were able to activate at the fire department and have communications with assisting agencies that responded from south of Eau Claire.

- 3.) **Capital Improvement Project(s) for 2017** – I have been asked as to what the future holds for any other radio system improvements or upgrades in the county after this project is completed. For that answer I advised that I have submitted a total capital improvement project in the \$400,000 range +/- which would improve the following:
 - Add more increased coverage to the SWLAW main channel
 - Add more channel capacity for another law enforcement channel
 - Add more paging sites in the county
 - Add more coverage to the fire channel in the county
 - Add a second fire channel (fire tac channel) that can be used countywide


